Leviticus 13:1-2, 44-46

A reading from the book of Leviticus

The Lord spoke to Moses and Aaron, saying:

"When a person has on the skin of the body a swelling or an eruption or a spot, and it turns into a leprous disease on the skin of the body, that person shall be brought to Aaron the priest or to one of his sons the priests.

"A person who has the leprous disease shall wear torn clothes and let the hair of the head be dishevelled and shall cover the upper lip and cry out, 'Unclean, unclean.'

A person shall remain unclean as long as the disease persists; and being unclean, that person shall live alone with a dwelling outside the camp."

Second Reading

2 Corinthians 10:3 - 11:1

A reading from the first letter of Paul to the Corinthians
"All things are lawful," but not all things are beneficial.
"All things are lawful," but not all things are built up.
Do not seek your own advantage, but that of the other.
Eat whatever is sold in the meat market
without raising any question on the ground of conscience,
for "the earth and its fullness are the Lord's."
If an unbeliever invites you to a meal,
and you are disposed to go,
eat whatever is set before you,
without raising any question on the ground of conscience.
But if someone says to you,
"This has been offered in sacrifice,"
then do not eat it,
out of consideration for the one who informed you,
and for the sake of conscience-
I mean the other's conscience, not your own.
For why should my liberty

be subject to the judgement of someone else's conscience?
If I partake in thankfulness,
why should I be denounced because of that for which I give thanks?

Whether you eat or drink, or whatever you do,
do everything for the glory of God.
Give no offense to Jews or to Greeks
or to the church of God,
just as I try to please everyone in everything I do,
not seeking my own advantage, but that of many,
so that they may be saved.

Be imitators of me, as I am of Christ.
